Joint visit to Guernsey and Normandy Sunday April 28th – Friday 3rd May 2019

Sunday 28th April Ferry from Poole (08.30) to Cherbourg (13.45) 4 people plus car £175. Possible visit to Jardin Botanique de Vauville near Dielette. (info@jardin-vauville.fr) Overnight near Dielette. (Dielette is half an hour by car from Cherbourg) Here is the provisional programme for the trip to Guernsey and Normandy.

Monday 29th April Passenger boat to Guernsey from Dielette– return fare approx. 65 euro. Leaves approx. 09.00 and sailing is one hour 10 mins. (cars will stay at Dielette.) Overnight in Marton B and B attached to the Pandora Hotel, St Peter Port, whose facilities we can use. (Approx 90 euros per night for a double room) **Tuesday 30th April** free day in Guernsey (Sark or walking in Guernsey, bus tour etc. as desired) Overnight at Marton B and B

Wednesday 1st May Visit to Victor Hugo's House and other possibilities. Return by ferry to mainland at approx. 18.30. Stay in same hotel as on Sunday night.

Thursday 2nd May Visit to gardens, villages etc in this northern part of Normandy. Visit to Ile Tatihou. (resa.tatihou@manche.fr)

Friday 3rd May Visit to places of interest. Return to Cherbourg where we will take the high-speed ferry back to Portsmouth. Depart 1700, arrive 1900.

A few notes: Unfortunately, the high-speed crossing from Portsmouth to Cherbourg does not start until May 1st. We therefore have to go from Poole where the departure time is rather early and the sailing is slower. People may decide to stay in a hotel near Poole the night before or set off very early from London.

The timetable for the sailings between Guernsey and Dielette will not be published until October (probably towards the end of the month) but we were able to find out the dates at least fortunately. Timings given here are based on past experience. After May 1st there are no sailings between Dielette and Guernsey until the end of the week as the ferry shifts to Dielette- Jersey. So altogether sailings have played a large part in deciding this itinerary!

If we have enough people we should be able to get reductions at various places. At the moment we do not know how many French will be coming but Josiane will be sorting this out. She will also be doing the bookings for the hotels and crossings to Guernsey. At the moment it looks like 8 people from Friends of Chaville. Josiane will need deposits for some of the hotel stays which will need to be booked up as soon as we have definite numbers from the French and the English.

Memories of pre-war Chaville


I am delighted that Barnet, where I have lived since 1971 and may end my days, is twinned with Chaville, where I almost began them. I was born of English parents in 1934 in the British Hospital in Paris. My mother was a high-kicking Tiller Girl at the Casino de Paris and my father worked in a chemicals company and wore spats. After a couple of years in a flat in Levallois-Perret, where I was wheeled around Parc Monceau in one of those deep prams they used in pre-baby-buggy times, the family, including now my younger brother Bob, moved to 23 Avenue Talamon, Chaville. It must have been a dramatic change in her way of life for my mother: eight years on the stage in New York, Johannesburg, London and Paris and then, at twenty-four, having to give all this up to bring up two young sons in a suburban house.

I remember only a little of my time there. Playing in front of the house on the slope down to the garage. Walking through a smelly little tunnel under the railway line next to our house and going to the dairy in the village to ask for 'un peu de lait'. Going into the city and seeing the little green and white buses with open platforms at the back, as well as the fancy metalwork around the base of pavement trees.

Back in Chaville, a memory of the late 1930s is of the 'Tank Road' as we called the main road at the other end of Avenue Talamon that led to nearby Versailles. I imagine we called it that because we used to see tanks transported along it. The railway line visible from the back windows of our house and just beyond the garden also carried goods wagons laden with military equipment - armoured cars perhaps or, again, tanks. I remember my father, who had German as well as French friends and spoke both languages, worrying about the likelihood of war.

In late August 1939 we went away for our annual holiday. That year it was to Wimereux, a seaside town just north of Boulogne. I have a vague memory of an evening in the hotel garden with other hotel guests. I was wearing pyjamas. There was also a corner that we passed on the way to and from the beach that smelt of rotting fish. Suddenly, one day, everything changed. My mother, Bob and I had to pack quickly and catch the ferry to England, whether from Boulogne or Calais I don't know. I suspect this was because of the announcement of the German non-aggression pact with the Soviet Union on August 23. My father, like so many others, would have known what this meant: Hitler now had *carte blanche* to invade neighbouring countries. He did not join us, at least not immediately. He returned to his work in Paris, leaving on one of the last ferries out of the country in May 1940.

I enjoyed the ferry trip, not least because I was given a tube of unfamiliar sweets whose name had something to do with the navy. My father's mother put us up for the night at her house in Hackney and then we took a coach to Blackpool, my mother's home town, where her brother and his family kindly took us in. We lived there through the 'phoney war' until in spring 1940 my mother was able to rent a house near London ready



for my father's return. It was in Hornchurch, Essex, a mile or so from the Battle of Britain airfield of that name. The battle itself hadn't yet begun, but coming down south when we did meant we had a few months to settle in before sleeping in our Anderson shelter beneath the dogfights above, and searching next morning for bright jagged pieces of shrapnel. 23 Avenue Talamon seemed – and was – a different world.
